#### **Dear Friends,**

Every second Wednesday of the month, members of the URI Cooperation Circle (CC) Approval Committee meet in a conference call to review applications. This Committee is formed by one Trustee of each global region, and the individual wisdom of the members is collected in a rich conversation always directed to ensure a healthy and steady growth for URI.

In a world that is suffering nonsensical violence which creates fear and hatred among its people, it is encouraging to share that URI has had 32% growth since 2014. In 12 months, 91 organizations and groups have been approved to belong to URI. This is the largest number of CCs incorporated in a year since URI's inception. Another curious note is that most of this growth took place in Africa, Asia and Middle East and North Africa, where the challenge of violence is impacting lives heavily. In 2015, URI has also grown a presence in eight new countries, bringing the total number of countries in which we work from 85 to 93.

URI is a global grassroots interfaith network that cultivates peace and justice by engaging people to bridge religious and cultural differences and work together for the good of their communities and the world. The fact that existing organizations and groups have decided to join this network speaks to the need to strengthen the interconnectedness and interdependence among those cultivating peace and justice and addressing conflict drivers, such as poverty and lack of education, around the world. This time calls for a strategy and collaboration among forces of good, and URI is offering the platform for this to happen.

Australian Religious Response to Climate Change CC, based in Sydney, was approved as a member in November. They give a clear answer when asked why the organization chose to apply: "It's hard to get momentum without critical mass which leads to energy."

URI envisions a world at peace, sustained by engaged and interconnected communities committed to respect for diversity, nonviolent resolution of conflict and social, political, economic and environmental justice. May this vision bring life and light to our world today!

#### **URI Welcomes 91 New Cooperation Circles for 2015**

Last year, URI welcomed 69 new Cooperation Circles to the family. This year, we are proud to welcome an impressive 91 new Cooperation Circles, including members from eight new countries. This is a 32 percent increase over last year; what an incredible gift for us all to share!

Cooperation Circles (CCs) are the heart of URI. Each circle, comprised of at least seven members from at least three faiths or traditions, is a self-organized group working to improve the world. Members from different cultures and belief traditions collaborate to tackle shared problems as they banish harmful stereotypes forever. "[We] believe that labels of religion, caste and creed along with greed for money have divided the society to such an extent that there is lack of unity, brotherhood, knowledge and most importantly love," writes CC leaders from Atman: The Samuhaa, a URI Asia Cooperation Circle that joined URI in September. "To address this situation of negativity and chaos, [we] have gathered to join URI."

What's especially wonderful is that each Cooperation Circle accomplishes this goal in a different way. Our new Cooperation Circles tackle a number of key social issues such as healing multi-generational feuds between Christians and Muslims in Ghana, battling climate change through restoring indigenous practices worldwide, assisting the homeless and hungry in cities that don't have sufficient human services funding, treating and comforting victims of cancer and AIDS in Malawi, and managing sacred music festivals to honor diversity in Australia. That's what makes our organization so remarkable. Working together, we find strength in our diversity – which is, appropriately, the same message we broadcast to the world.

The most impressive part of independent groups working around the globe on so many peacebuilding projects is

the way each Cooperation Circle amplifies its companions' efforts. Our network allows us to comfort and heal each other in times of need, and to help each other reach greater heights in times of success. Together, we link arms in an embrace that circles the world.
