Launching Girls Not Brides Campaign in Mozambique

On 22nd October 2017 soon after returning from the URI Assembly for CC leaders and youth leaders, which took place in Malawi early October, AMIMAMO made a visit to Mbetazigone community where the first projected projects are to take place. The visit was possible with the support from the Catholic University of Mozambique – Lichinga Extension as one of our local partners who offered a school bus to the village.

At this meeting, the aim was to inform community members about AMIMAMO project developments, to awaken and maintain confidence of the community, to give feedback from the youth leadership training in Blantyre, and to launch the Girls Not Brides Campaign. The main focus of this campaign is to instruct parents to deny early marriage and to incentive their daughters to go school. Highlights from our Youth Development Team

So this year, as the Youth Development Coordinator, I (Sarah) set out to start collating an accurate representation of who the young people are in the different CCs, get a sense of their involvement and leadership capabilities, run a series of context-specific interfaith dialogue and skills trainings, and by the end of the year be able to identify key leaders from the different CCs and regions who would be able to step up as young leaders in URI and take this work forward.



What has happened:

We've run three major events this year, a Human Rights Day Interfaith Youth Leadership Session in the Gauteng Region, a follow up longer 3-day training in June, and then a 3-day training in Malawi, with youth representatives from the different CCs there. From these three main events, we've been able to connect youth leaders within the CCs, raise awareness of youth-related issues, and establish a clear strategy for leveraging the youth agenda in URI across the region. There have also been various follow up initiatives that have come from these initial trainings. Here are some of the highlights from the trainings:

Human Rights Day Interfaith Youth Leadership Session (March 2017)

- 28 participants
- 5 CCs/organisations represented (United and Share for Peace and Prosperity CC, Parliament of the People Schaumberg CC, Gifted for Good, The Muslim Youth of South Africa, and FEED)
- Covering topics such as the difference between a debate and dialogue; what kind of space we intend to create when doing interfaith work, that allows people to feel safe but also learn; reflections on our own spiritual journeys, and how to listen with an open heart and an intention of building trust, respect and compassion.
- One key outcome: The youth from the Schaumberg CC, Winnie and Thabo, were invited to join the leadership committee of their CC, and were given free learnerships to develop their skills after this event! Read More about this event.

3-Day Interfaith Youth Leadership Training with Gauteng Region Youth CCs (June 2017)

- 25 Participants
- 7 organisations represented: Youth ChangeMakers Parliament, Connecting the Dots CC, Gifted for Good, Kundalini Earth, Schaumberg Field of Dreams CC, South African Indigenous Peoples Association (SAiPA) and the Muslim Youth of Southern Africa.
- Facilitated by Ignatius France (from GOAL CC) and Sarah Oliver
- Variety of creative methods and interactive activities used.
- CCs shared their work, best practices and areas of growth
- Whatsapp group formed to keep communication going, and share further opportunities

3-Day Interfaith Youth Leadership Training in Malawi (October 2017)

At the beginning of October, Sarah Oliver (South Africa), Nyambura Mundia (Kenya) and Geoffrey Manasseh (Malawi) worked as a team of 3 facilitators, to run a 3 day Interfaith Youth Leadership Training with CC young leaders in Malawi. Each CC in Malawi was invited to send two youth representatives to the training. The aim of the training was to begin to build the network of young leaders within Malawi's CCs to be able to work together and support each other, giving the youth skills in leadership, project management, interfaith dialogue and community

building, to leverage the voice of young people in their CCs and region more widely. The training happened just before our Regional Assembly, early October.

There were many learning moments that came from experience, that have informed conceptualisation and work of the youth development team in Southern Africa going forward. For the most part these were questions about context, how to balance the need for interfaith dialogue and understanding with skills trainings and the urgent needs of local communities, how to work with youth from varying educational backgrounds, and varying levels of involvement in their CC organisational structure, and to fully understand URIs role in committing to youth development and what this actually means in practice. What we know for sure is that through these trainings we've been able to identify key individuals who will be important leaders in taking



this work forward with their peers and in their communities. We've also grown a much better understanding of the context and communities our CCs are working in, and where we might play a role. This has been a year of laying the foundations for the youth development work, and it can only grow from here.

Follow Up Initiatives:

Thsegofatso (Kingston) and Thabo attend the LionHearted Leadership Training

In a spur of the moment opportunity, Thsegofatso Makwe and Thabo Khunou, both whom attended the URI Youth Leadership Training in Gauteng, were granted the incredible full scholarship to attend a week-long leadership training with the Linda Tucker Foundation and the Global White Lions Trust. The Linda Tucker Foundation is one of our newest CCs and so it is incredibly special to able to offer these opportunities to well-deserving youth through URI. Thsegofatso and Thabo captured their experience in a report, which you can read by clicking this link. Here is a snapshot:



"Upon arrival the two met with their fellow campers and all were vibrantly welcome by Mama Agnes and her forever nurturing staff who was to take care of our wellbeing, Mama Linder Tucker and Mama Mae Tucker who made sure that it was easy to understand and adapt to the way of the White Lion. Campers were given time to settle into their rooms and shortly after Mama Linder Tucker introduced the 13 laws of a Lion Hearted leader which are, Origination, Appreciation, Communication, Nurturance, Radiance, Regeneration, Collaboration, Authentication, Co-Creation, Governance, Liberation, Aspiration and Elimination. This was our first gathering and these were to be the laws we have to adapt throughout the week and carry them through life as we share them with all those around us.

We had various game drives that we went on and all of them were to really remind us that the lion carries great strength, responsibility and is a lethal animal, but is also secret and that it carries a lot of messages coming direct from the source which is the Creator. One also learns through Linder Tuckers teachings that

in order for all to live in harmony as intended by the Creator we need to show love that is unconditional, light that is everlasting and truth that is absolute, this is evident in the yoga practices that we do every morning it brings light into ones heart and body, and also gets one projecting light back into the world where it is most needed.

In conclusion we are very thankful to all the people that made it possible that Thabo and Kingston make a spontaneous decision of leaving whatever it is they were doing in their lives and attend this course. The USPP, The URI and Mama Berry. We also thank Mama Karen for walking with us every step of the way ensuring that we got there safely and back. We are now living with the spirit of Tsau and it is a matter of sharing the light others around us."

Since the first training in Malawi, Geoffrey Manasseh has continued the work of youth development in Malawi in an intentional and caring way, committed to sharing what was experienced at the initial youth training with a much wider audience of young people across the country.

This past weekend, Geoffrey facilitated a two day training for the young people in his region of Lilongwe. He worked with other CCs in the area, YASED and Karonga CC, to bring together a group of 82 young people (39 boys and 43 girls). Timothy Duncan and Paulette Mwela, two young leaders who were participants at the first training, supported Geoffrey in leading this follow up training and sharing their knowledge and skills.



The Mayor of Lilongwe also attended the event to address the young people.

The two days were incredibly successful as the content was shared effectively, and everyone enjoyed themselves. The community also came together to support with providing food for the participants.

I'd like to acknowledge Geoffrey for his confidence, skill and leadership in running this follow up training - it keeps the momentum going from the initial training, and widens the reach of the work in a fantastic way. We are deeply appreciative of the work being done by him and his team!
